


Fall 2017 Census Day Enrollment Statistics

Master of Divinity

- MDiv is **the standard program** for training pastors in the North American Division.
- With more than 440 students, Theological Seminary serves students from many backgrounds, ethnicities and both genders.



- Master of Divinity stands at the center of the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary's degree offerings and is for BA graduates and young pastors.
- Master of Arts in Pastoral Ministry (MAPM) is another degree for pastors which is aimed for older active pastors (unwritten principle: above 35 years old).

MDiv Mission Statement

In harmony with the mission and core values of the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary, the Master of Divinity degree equips called committed men and women with practical biblical, theological, and ministerial knowledge and skills to prepare them for Christlike service as leaders and equippers.

MDiv Program Goals

The goals of the MDiv program are to equip men and women of deep spirituality, mature character, emotional balance, intellectual capacity, and passion for learning to:

- 1. Be Bible-grounded, Christ-centered, Spirit-led leaders, living and serving with spiritual depth and integrity reflecting the fruit of the Spirit, growing from their personal relationship with the triune God;
- 2. Be mighty in the Scriptures, faithfully interpreting, practically applying, and powerfully proclaiming the Word of God within the gospel-centered worldview of the Great Controversy;
- 3. Promote Seventh-day Adventist identity, unity, and mission based on Scripture, viewed in the context of Adventist heritage within Christian history;
- Lead Spirit-gifted, culturally-sensitive, and diverse communities in practicing transformational worship and ministry committed to making disciples from among "every nation, kindred, tongue and people" in the context of the Three Angels' Message of Revelation 14.

MDiv Program Learning Outcomes

Our MDiv Graduate:

- (Character) Models spiritual humility, maturity and integrity grounded in a living experience with God, nurtured by the sanctifying presence and power of the Holy Spirit.
- **(Scholarship)** Manifests the practices of a Biblical scholar-theologian engaging the Bible, Christian/Adventist heritage and professional resources with theological maturity for personal growth and for facilitating the theological competence of others.
- 3. (Discipleship & Evangelism) Demonstrates personal commitment, passion and essential skills for discipleship and evangelism, while training members to carry out ministry within the scope of the local and global mission of the Seventh-day Adventist church.
- 4. (Leadership) Exercises creative and visionary leadership as a minister and servant of Christ, discerning the needs, spiritual gifts and potential of others, in order to equip and engage in their God-given ministries.
- **(Worship)** Facilitates enriching corporate worship that brings diverse peoples into the transforming presence of God.
- **6. (Administration/Management)** Engages the abilities of self and others to strategically steward personal and corporate resources including time, health, finances, property and service in areas of spiritual giftedness.
- (Relationships) Models effective relationships with people of diverse cultures, backgrounds, character, and persuasions, reflecting the wisdom, compassion, and discernment of Jesus through the work of the Spirit.
